Autumn 1 curriculum: In addition to English and Maths, your child will be studying a particular topic into which many of their lessons will feed. Below is a synopsis of how the topic will be studied and some opportunities to extend the learning at home.

TOPIC: <i>Magical Times with Nursery Rhymes</i>
<p>Week 1 – Welcome to School Week 2 – Incy Wincy Week 3 – Humpty Dumpty Week 4 – 1,2,3,4,5 Week 5 – Little Bo Peep Week 6 – Twinkle Twinkle Week 7 – Little Miss Muffet</p>

Communication and Language	Understand how to listen carefully and why listening is important. Engage in story and rhyme times.
Personal, Social and Emotional Development	See themselves as a valuable individual. Build constructive and respectful relationships. Express their feelings and consider the feelings of others.
Physical Development	Further develop the skills they need to manage the school day successfully: lining up and queuing and mealtimes.
English	Read individual letters by saying the sounds for them.
Mathematics	Matching. Sorting & Comparing Numbers 1, 2, 3
Understanding the World	Talk about members of their immediate family and community. Name and describe people who are familiar to them.
Expressive Arts and Design	Develop storylines in their pretend play.

<p>Possible family visits/ activities which would enrich your child's learning:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Sing rhymes together encouraging the children to say the rhyming words independently. • Visit your local library and encourage a love of reading. • Visit Willows Farm and watch Peter Rabbit come to life in an outdoor show. 	<p>How to support your child: Practical ways to support your child's learning:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Read regularly with your child. • Revise the phonics sounds taught within the week. • Practice the pre-writing shapes to aid with correct letter formation. • Play games which involve a dice and recognising the patterns that the dots make. • Play games which involve listening and responding e.g. musical statues.
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
